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Statistical Overview

The aim of this overview is to present a number of key figures regarding migration and asylum in Denmark. For a monthly update of the main figures in this publication, reference is made to the website www.newtodenmark.dk.

Summary

Migratory and asylum trends 2014

In 2014 a total number of 72.342 residence permits were granted in the area of migration and asylum. The largest nationalities in 2014 were Romania (6.160), Poland (5.893), Syria (5.665), USA (4.073) and India (3.516).

An increase in the number of asylum seekers

The number of asylum seekers increased from 7.557 in 2013 to 14.792 in 2014.

The largest nationalities in 2014 were Syria (7.087), Eritrea (2.285), stateless (1.362), Somalia (683) and Russia (522). These nationalities accounted for 80 percent of all asylum seekers.

The number of residence permits granted to refugees increased from 3.889 in 2013 to 6.104 in 2014.

The share of positive asylum decisions (the recognition rate) granted by the Danish Immigration Service (1st instance) was 74 percent in 2014 compared to 55 percent in 2013.

Accommodation of asylum seekers

By the end of 2014 a total number of 10.764 persons were accommodated. This is an increase of 5.399 compared to the end of 2013.

At the end of 2014 a total number of 66 accommodation centres were in operation, and the accommodation partners were the Red Cross, Jammerbrugt Municipality, Langeland Municipality, Thisted Municipality and Vesthimmerland Municipality.

An increase in the number of permits granted for family reunification

The total number of applications in the area of family reunification was 12.307 in 2014 compared to 7.215 in 2013. The largest nationalities in 2014 were Syria (4.767), Somalia (1.079), Thailand (626), stateless (529) and the Philippines (476).

The number of granted residence permits for family reunification increased from 5.112 in 2013 to 5.727 in 2014. The increase is primarily driven by a rise in family reunifications, where the person is a spouse whom has been granted refugee status in Denmark. This group increased from 636 permits in 2013 to 1.493 permits in 2014.

The share of positive family reunification decisions was 80 percent in 2014.

The largest nationalities in terms of family reunification in 2014 were Syria (1.465), Thailand (454), the Philippines (339), Somalia (317), and Afghanistan (257), corresponding to about 50 percent of the total number of residence permits issued for family reunification.

Increase in the number of permits under the Job Plan etc. and to other wage-earners

The number of permits for schemes under the Job Plan (collective designation for highly skilled workers) was 5.954 in 2014 - compared to 5.985 permits in 2013.

In the area of work, most permits are granted according to the Pay Limit Scheme. A total of 3.173 were given in 2014, while 2.961 were given in 2013. The number of permits granted according to the Greencard Scheme has increased significantly from 2.327 permits in 2013 to 2.250 permits in 2014.

35 percent of all permits for Schemes under the Job Plan etc. were granted to persons from India.

In 2014 the number of residence permits issued to other wage-earners and self-employed increased. In 2013 a total number of 1.781 permits were granted, while the figure in 2014 was 1.921 permits (of which 46 permits for self-employed).

33 percent of permits to other wage-earners were granted to persons from Ukraine.

More foreign students attend higher education in Denmark

The number of permits in the area of study increased from 6.982 in 2013 to 7.425 in 2014. Of these, the number of residence permits issued to foreign students following an education at one of the universities in Denmark increased from 5.136 permits in 2013 to 5.288 in 2014.

50 percent of the permits for educational purposes at danish universities were granted to persons from USA, whilst 13 percent were granted to persons from China.

Permits to au pairs decreased from 1.989 permits in 2013 to 1.908 permits in 2014.

82 percent of the permits to au pairs were granted to persons from the Philippines, while 76 percent of the permits to interns were granted to persons from Ukraine.

Half of all permits were granted to EU/EEA citizens

The number of residence cards and registration certificates issued to EU/EEA citizens increased from 32.027 in 2013 to 35.415 in 2014 - an increase corresponding to 11 percent. The increase is seen in the number of registration certificates issued for the purpose of work, which rose from 14.741 in 2013 to 16.944 in 2014.

The number of registration certificates issued for the purpose of study increased from 9.372 in 2013 to 9.616 in 2014.

The largest share of EU/EEA permits were granted to citizens from Romania (6.136), Poland (5.871), Germany (3.147), Lithuania (2.695) and Italy (2.217).

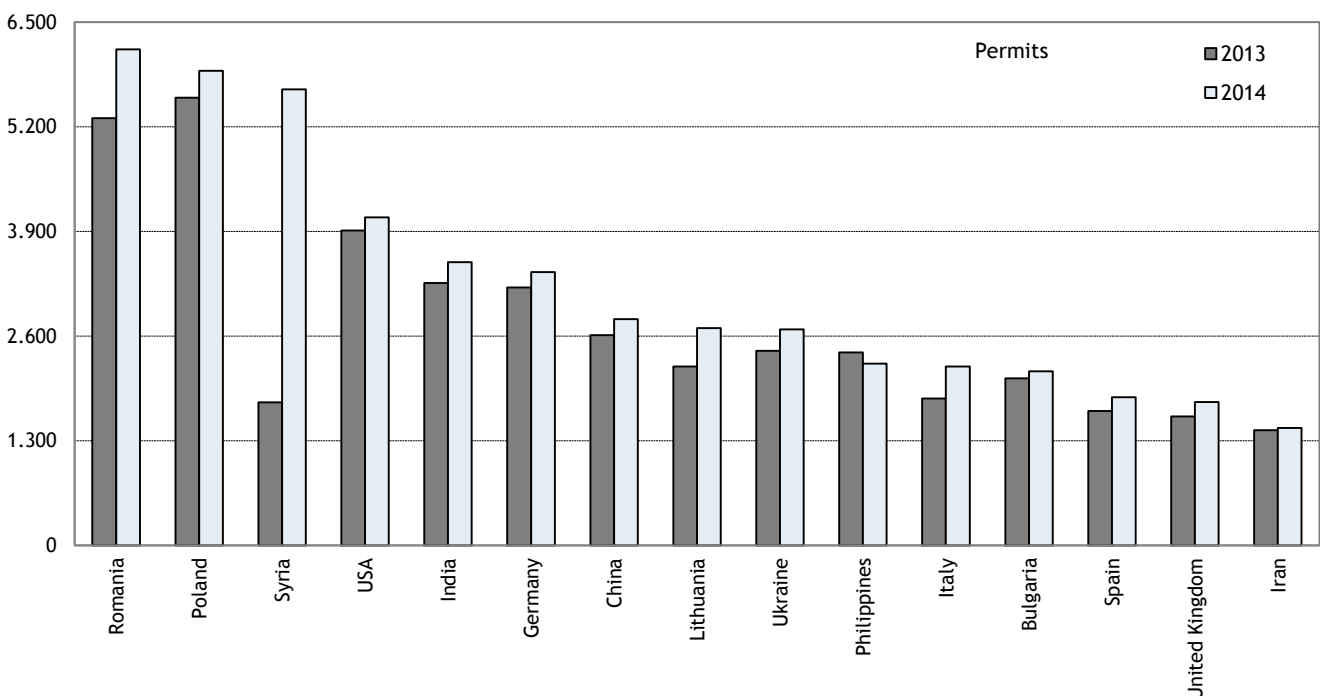
Visa

A total number of 102.402 visas were issued in 2014. This figure includes 99.232 visas granted by the Ministry of Foreign Affairs and 3.170 visas granted by the Danish Immigration Service. In 2014 the recognition rate for all visa cases was 95 percent.

The three largest nationalities were China (27.736), India (12.538) and Russia (12.040). Visas for these three nationalities constituted for slightly more than half of all visas issued in 2014.

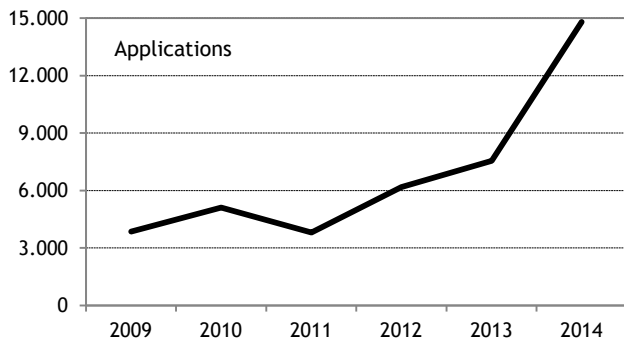
The primary purposes of travel in 2014 were tourism and transit (33.734), business reasons (33.513), and visit to family and friends (26.210).

All issued residence permits 2013 - 2014 - broken down by the fifteen largest nationalities in 2014

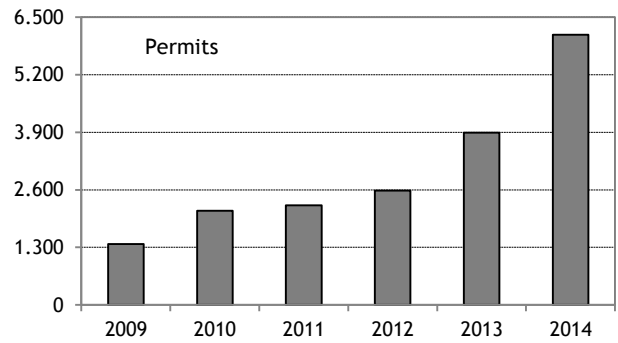

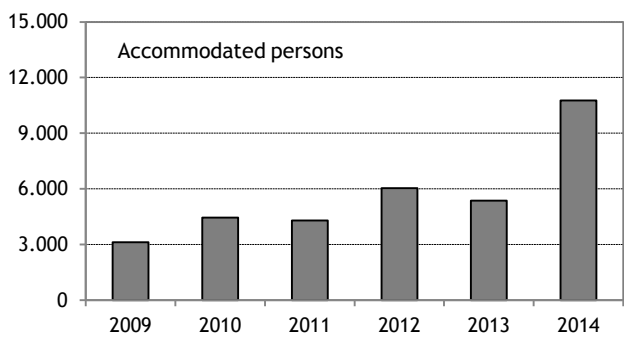
Asylum applications 2009 - 2014



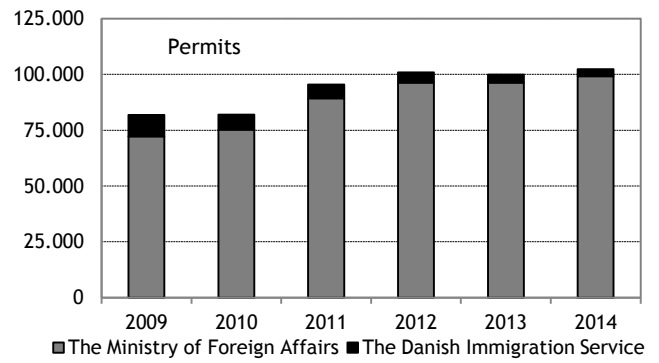
Positive decisions for asylum etc. 2009 - 2014



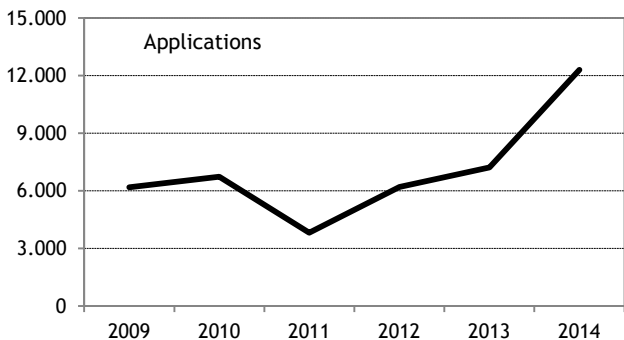
Accommodated at the end of 2009 - 2014



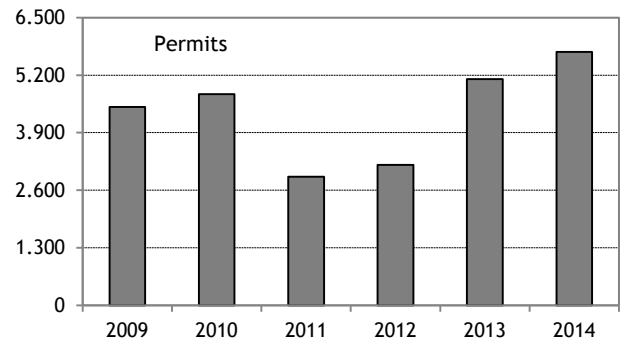
Visas granted by the Ministry of Foreign Affairs and the Danish Immigration Service 2009 - 2014



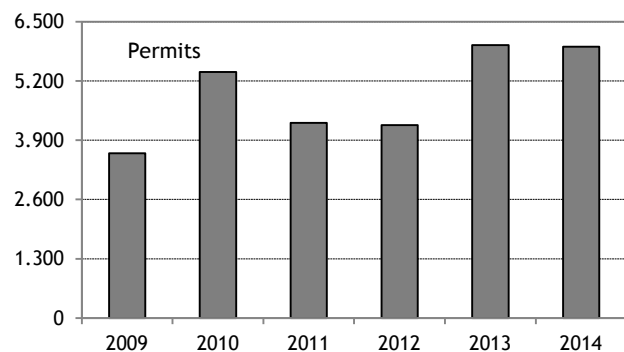
Applications for family reunification 2009 - 2014



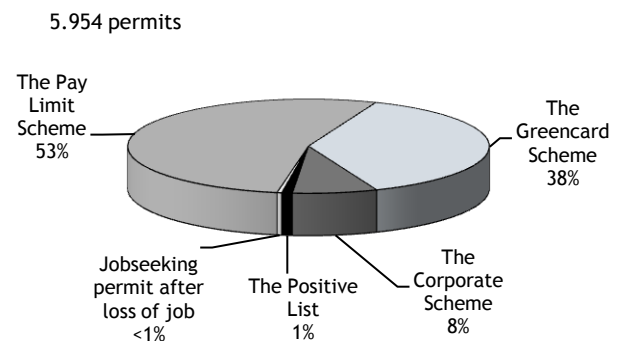
Positive decisions for family reunification 2009 - 2014



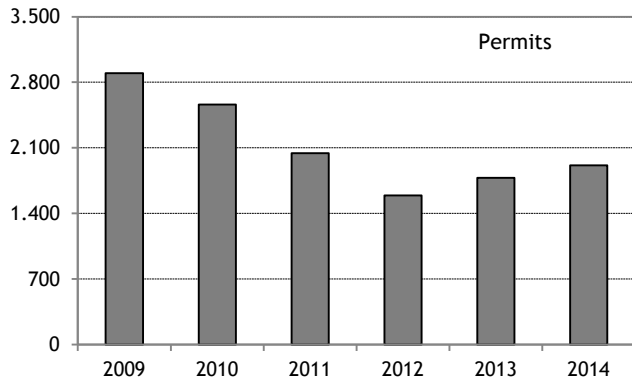
Positive decisions for Schemes under the Job Plan etc. 2009 - 2014



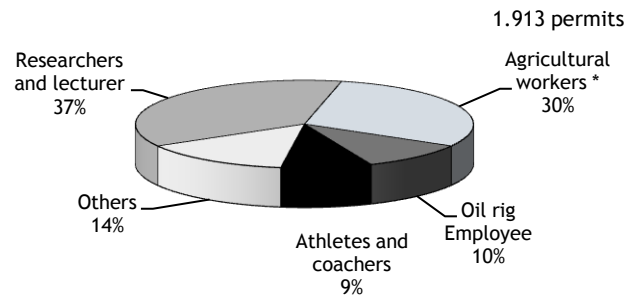
Positive decisions for Schemes under the Job Plan etc. 2014



Positive decisions for other wage-earners and self-employed 2009 - 2014

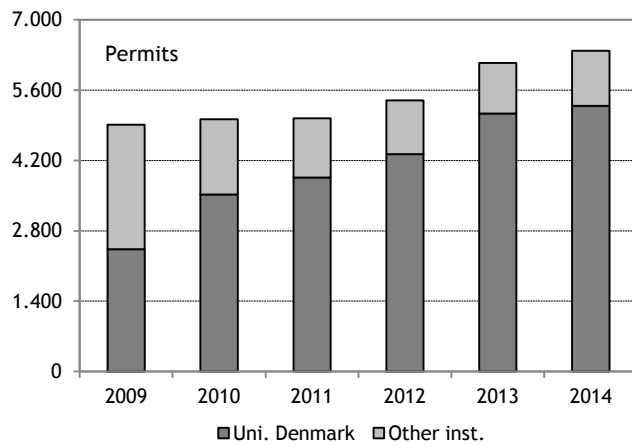


Positive decisions for other wage-earners and self-employed - broken down by largest categories 2014

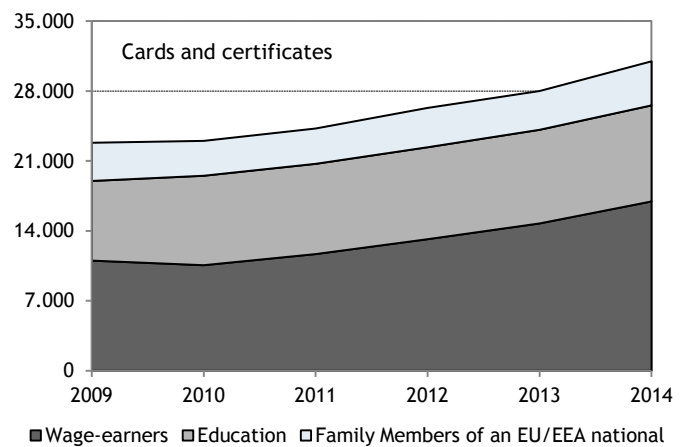

There can also be cases where a residence permit is not used, because the person concerned never enters the country.

The number of the additional work permit to students were 4.635 permits in 2008, 3.849 permits in 2009, 3.410 permits in 2010 and 4.808 permits in 2011.

Note: There is not a direct link between the number of asylum applications in 2014 and the number of decisions in 2014, due to the fact that asylum seekers do not necessarily receive their decisions in the same year as their applications are lodged. Moreover, an applicant, who is denied asylum at the first instance and has the right to appeal, will be counted both as a refusal issued by the Danish Immigration Service and as a permit (i.e. reversal of the Danish Immigration Service's refusal) or as a refusal granted by the Refugee Board. There can be a time gap across calendar years between the first and final decision.

The percentage of vetoes in manifestly unfounded cases, i.e. cases where the Danish Refugee Council disagrees with the Danish Immigration Service, amounted to approximately 9 percent in 2014

Stateless:

The UN convention of 28 September 1954 concerning the status of stateless persons, which Denmark has ratified, contains in article 1, section 1, the following definition of the term stateless person: "For the purpose of this Convention, the term 'stateless person' means a person who is not considered as a national by any State under the operation of its law."

The purpose of the convention is to administer and improve the legal position of those persons who involuntarily have come into the situation that no state recognizes them as nationals. The Convention is not meant to give certain persons the opportunity to choose themselves whether they wish to be nationals of a particular state.

Persons, who seek asylum in Denmark, are registered by the immigration authorities upon arrival. In connection with the initial registration the Danish Immigration Service attempts to ascertain the identity and nationality (citizenship) of the asylum seeker including whether the person is stateless. The registration is based on the asylum seekers' explanation and any written documents etc. In addition, the Danish Immigration Service will take into consideration information on conditions in the applicant's country of origin. Based on these informations The Danish Immigration Service may alter the registration whilst processing the asylum case.

If a foreigner in Denmark finds that he or she is registered with erroneous data, for example in relation to date of birth or nationality (citizenship) in the records of the immigration authorities, said person can at any time contact the Danish Immigration Service and submit a request for re-registration. The Danish Immigration Service will hereafter make a decision on whether there are grounds for altering the existing records. The latter decision can be appealed to the Ministry of Justice.

- You must still qualify for temporary residence
- You must be over the age of 18
- You must have resided legally in Denmark for at least five years
- You must not have a criminal record. If you have been sentenced to more than 18 months in prison, you are disqualified from receiving permanent residency. If you have been sentenced to less than 18 months in prison (whether suspended or served), you are temporarily disqualified from receiving permanent residence
- You must not have any overdue public debts
- You must not have received certain types of public benefits for a period of three years prior to submitting your application for permanent residence, or while your application is being processed
- You must have submitted a signed declaration of integration and active citizenship in Denmark
- You must have passed the Danish language test 1 or a Danish language test of an equivalent or higher level
- You must have held a regular full-time employment and/or been enrolled in an educational programme in Denmark for at least three of the five years prior to submitting your application for a permanent residence permit
- You must be working or studying at the time of becoming eligible for a permanent residence permit

Please note that special rules apply if:

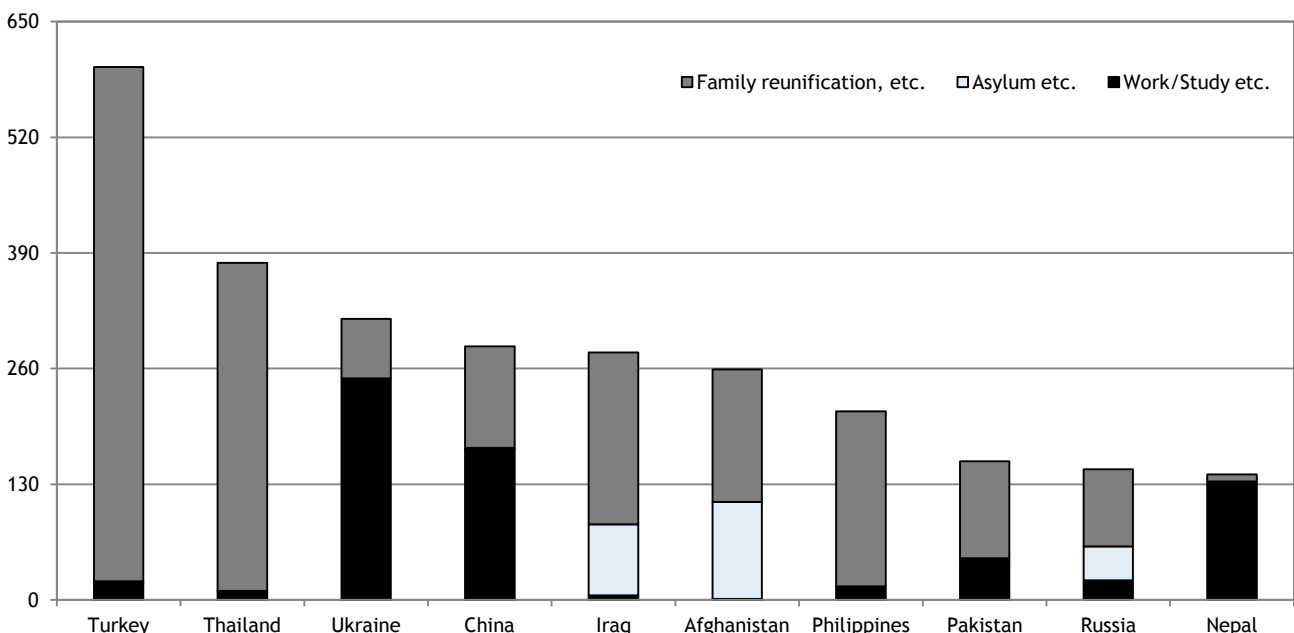
- You have had asylum in Denmark (refugees) for the past eight years, and have shown a willingness to integrate
- You are between the ages of 18 and 19, and have worked or studied continuously since completing primary school (folkeskolen)
- You have a strong connection to Denmark
- You are a pensioner or early age pensioner

If you do not meet the requirements for a permanent residence permit, you can instead apply for an extension of your temporary residence permit and then apply for a permanent residence permit at a later time.

* The main persons are applicants for Danish citizenship over the age of 18, who are listed on a naturalization bill, since they fulfill the necessary conditions in order to acquire Danish citizenship. The subordinates are the children of the main persons, the children must be under than 18. Children can only acquire citizenship together with the main person, if the main person has custody over the child, and the child is unmarried and lives in Denmark. The information is based on the Nationality Divisions Check List System (TLS).

Note: Persons accepted on to a naturalization bill, on the condition that they release themselves of their current citizenship, will only acquire Danish nationality, if they can document that they have been released from their present citizenship within a time limit of 2 years from when the act was passed. If the person cannot prove the latter within the given time limit, he/she will not be able to acquire a Danish citizenship according to this act.

A summary of the conditions that must be met in order to acquire Danish citizenship by naturalization:

A number of conditions must be satisfied in order to become listed on a naturalization bill:

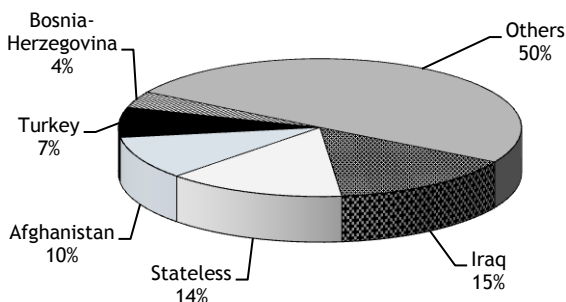
- the applicant must have been granted permanent residency and reside in Denmark
- the applicant must, as a general rule, have resided continuously in Denmark for at least 9 years
- the applicant must substantiate his or her Danish skills by submitting a certificate of the Danish 3 Examination from the Danish language centers or a corresponding certificate on a similar level
- the applicant must prove to have some knowledge of the Danish society, culture and history by presenting a certificate of a special citizenship test
- the applicant must currently support him- or herself, and cannot have received any public cash assistance within the latest year ahead of the introduction of the naturalization bill. Furthermore, the applicant may not, within the past five years, have received any public cash assistance for an aggregated period exceeding six months
- the applicant cannot have overdue debt to public authorities
- if the applicant has been sentenced for any criminal offences, the general rule is that he or she cannot be listed on a naturalization bill, until the expiration of a certain waiting period, and for some offences it is not at all possible to be listed on a naturalization bill
- the applicant must agree to renounce his or her present citizenship
- the applicant has to sign a declaration, in which he or she swears allegiance and loyalty to Denmark and Danish society, declare willingness to observe Danish legislation and respect fundamental Danish principles of law.

Persons born stateless in Denmark who are under the age of 18, may be listed on a naturalization bill in accordance with UN Convention on the Right of Child of 20 November 1989 without satisfying the usual requirements. The same applies to persons born stateless in Denmark who have reached the age of 18, but not the age of 21. These stateless persons are entitled to being listed on a naturalization bill in accordance with the UN Convention on the Reduction of Statelessness of 30 August 1961. - broken down by citizenship at time of the application

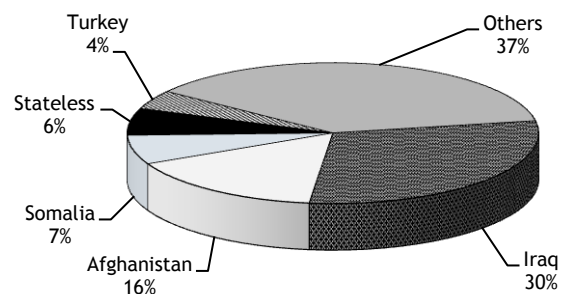

Note: The overview above, which displays all residence permits etc., does not directly reflect the actual level of immigration to Denmark. Over time an individual can be stated several times in the statistics (double counting). There can also be cases where a residence permit is not used, because the person concerned never enters the country.

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
